

TREASURER REPORT

The financial outlook for the year continues to brighten. As shown in the attached Profit & Loss statement through April 12, we are now slightly positive for the year, reflecting that our personnel costs have decreased significantly. Barring unforeseen expenses, this positive position should continue to increase over the coming months. Perhaps the most encouraging development is that our envelope giving is up significantly over the budgeted amount (\$35,957 received vs. \$30,787 projected through April 7). We are now in a wonderful position (for a treasurer, at least) of having sufficient money in the bank account to pay bills without having to 'borrow' from any designated funds!

As we move toward summer, please keep in mind that income historically decreases during the summer months, but bills do not. FRUSTRATIONS ABOUT JAILS/PRISONS!!

Knowing the USA is deep in debt (cutting more jobs, school, health and safety dollars) frustration comes from knowing of the waste of money and human lives by courts and prisons. Many organizations try to help; reports and protests are created, yet change is one step forward and two steps back. (Even speaking solely of economics, not even considering morals, or religious concern.)

FACT: Death penalty costs are exceedingly high, yet Ohio still has the death penalty, and those found innocent after years on death row pay are owed millions of dollars, from taxpayers, who "allowed" the processes that led to wrongful incarceration.

FACT: Ohio's Debtors' Prisons cost our Counties money! **EXAMPLES:** A man in Huron County owed \$1,434.10 (\$900.00 in fines plus \$534.10 of non-payment costs). He was only able to pay \$645.25 before being sent to jail for non-payment. Putting him in jail cost the County \$1,600 for arrest warrants and \$928.00 in jail costs. Upon release he still had no job, and no way to pay. His case cost the County a total **LOSS** of \$1,883.00.

A woman in Williams County owed \$2,095.00 and "costs" of \$1,001.10. She set up a \$50 a month plan (while providing for 2 children). She asked churches and agencies for help. She sold her car (her only transportation), and begged for community service in lieu of jail. She paid off \$1,209.00 but was incarcerated when she couldn't pay it all. Arrest warrants (\$2,000), jail costs (\$2,548.00) and two children left without a mother, in this case, resulted in a net **LOSS** to the County of \$3,339.00.

FACT: Debtors' prison practices violate the U.S. Constitution. Over 2 decades ago the U.S. Supreme Court banned the practice of jailing those who are unable to pay their fines and court costs.

FACT: Debtors' prison practices violate OH law. The OH Constitution, OH Revised Code and decisions of OH courts prohibit incarcerating indigent defendants for failure to pay their fines, requiring a meaningful hearing into an individual's financial resources before the court may impose jail time for failure to pay fines. Despite clear constitutional and legislative prohibitions, debtors' prison practices are alive and well throughout Ohio.

The costs of these unlawful practices make no economic sense, cost counties money and have serious and lasting impacts on the lives of poor Ohioans. People lose jobs, homes, health and families are harmed because of Debtors' prison practices, violating U.S. and Ohio law. This is not to say that "criminals" should not be held accountable. But poverty should not be a crime and common sense should enter the picture. Help rather than jail would be wise, economically and morally.

FACTS: Ohio is one of only 2 states allowing Mayors courts. Mayors, even if not licensed attorneys, and Mayor appointed unlicensed Magistrates preside over these cases. In 2011 there were 318 such courts across Ohio. These courts are largely unregulated and may hear only misdemeanor violations of local ordinances and state traffic laws. Over 84% of cases in these courts result from traffic tickets. The defendant is found guilty 86% of the time. Both municipal courts and mayors courts jail Ohioans in debtors' prison, illegally, and lose thousands of tax payer dollars.

I didn't receive a Benediction, a Blessing or a reminder from that song that says: "I am the Light of the World, You people come and follow me! If you follow and love, you'll learn the mystery of what you were meant to do and be!"

Please understand. You see, it was summer, maybe the weather was bad, I woke up late, I didn't feel well enough, I needed a break, it wouldn't hurt, no one would miss me, I'm not needed, just this once no one will mind, I'll go next Sunday, or next month at least, or start back in the fall, or sometime. I didn't mean to vote that way, but I did.

ASCENSION CRAFT
