#### FROM TODD'S DESK

"No one can serve two masters...For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also."

Matthew 6:24, 21 NRSV

Happy March! This month we continue our Lenten journey and keep looking toward the hope of the newness of life and resurrection proclaimed on the coming Easter morning!

The season of Lent is a time when we find ways to enter into reflection and contemplation. A time when we vow to let our guard down, to open ourselves, and to invite the light of God's love to shine in our hearts-even in those hidden corners. The thing is, at times that light shines on stuff that we have hidden away for a long time, stuff that we would rather not notice or think about because its hard for us to think of it and see it in any other way; things like privilege and status and treasure and money...

As we consider the 'hows and whats' of value and worth as followers of Jesus, Doris Powell offers some interesting insight when she notes that "Being stewards in the household of God is intensely countercultural." That is to say, it is in conflict with the values of our society because the world we live in encourages everyone to be "competitive, acquisitive, and accumulative" and embraces the idea that "there is no limit to the satisfaction of our desires." Because no matter how it is 'spun', our culture holds as sacred the idea that our worth is determined by what we possess.

But what if we shine the light of Jesus' words in Matthew on this? What if we treasure love more than stuff? What if we treat money as "just another resource to be allocated to endure shalom"? Imagine how it would transform our lives and our communities if each day we decided to live lives in which, "our spirit is nourished by living up to who God made us to be and that our worth is given by God.'

As we finish this season of Lent and look toward the celebration of new life on Easter morning, may we find that this time of intentionality has led us to transformation and that in the light of God's love, we discovered a new treasure! May we continue to proclaim, in word and thought and deed, the good news of God's Realm.

# ACTION IN MISSION—(A.I.M.)

There are 2 March missions—One Great Hour of Sharing and Heartfelt Tidbits.

One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) is a mission in which we join with Christians in seven other denominations to support relief services wherever and whenever disaster strikes in the U.S.A. and abroad, and also to provide longterm, sustainable development assistance, refugee resettlement, and social services. OGHS continues to support Church World Service in providing relief following the devastating hurricanes of 2017 (Irma, Harvey Maria) as well as 2018 Hurricane Michael in the Florida Panhandle. A \$250,000 goal has been set to assist with recovery from earthquakes in



Puerto Rico. A grant was awarded to respond to emergency health and psychological problems in Gaza among Palestinian children, mothers and other women in an area targeted by recent Israeli bombardment that killed close to three dozen and injured more than 100. Winterization items are being provided in Syria for residents struggling to survive prolonged war, displacement, and economic hardship. The UCC is also joining an ecumenical and financial response to the coronavirus. A pilot program to help communities launch long-term recovery following disasters is also now growing ecumenically. Our gifts allowed the U.C.C to make long term commitments to help rebuild housing and lives.

A portion of our OGHS offering goes to refugee relief and resettlement across the world. The UCC has been integrally involved in assisting in the Syrian refugee crisis since it began in 2011.

OGHS will continue to help other poor communities find and develop new sources of food and clean water, improve health standards and literacy, offer vocational education, and provide modest loans to poor people to start small businesses in order to become self-supporting (ie. women in Africa growing coffee). **Heartfelt Tidbits** is a local organization that provides support to refugees and recent immigrants living in Southwestern Ohio by facilitating integration and self-sufficiency through our innovative education, cultural and employment-enhancing programming.

With the help of over 110 passionate volunteers and in partnership with over 75 community organizations, these programs include English and citizenship classes, connecting clients to neighborhood resources, facilitating art and heartfelt sewing programs, creating community gardening projects, and promoting youth empowerment. Much of the work focuses on women who are particularly vulnerable due to limited language skills and isolation. Heartfelt Tidbits' sewing and art programs focus on economic self-sufficiency and the building of community among refugee and immigrant women.

It was Tim who directed Wendy to Lakeview when she first moved to Loveland.

**Wendy** shares her home with her 2 year old terrier, **Carnegie**. **Devin** lives in Colorado with his wife. **Devin** is a social worker/therapist who works in medical settings in Denver.

Wendy worked for several years prior to **Devin's** birth, writing and producing commercials for radio and TV, including a full-time stint as "Creative Services Director" for Channel 5, WLWT. She was a full-time mom while **Devin** was growing up, returning to employment initially at a furniture store, until her sales career was curtailed by a back injury. She later spent several years as a volunteer and employee of St. Vincent de Paul in Dayton. Her final job there was shift manager at the men's homeless shelter. She left that job in 2016 to care for her father who was living with her at the time.

**Wendy** enjoys reading, caring for her dog and gardening, although she is limited in her physical activity by arthritis, bursitis, and ongoing back pain. She has a heart for mission and is hoping to get reinvolved with AIM activities at Lakeview.

**Wendy** commented, "Lakeview has always felt like home." She is happy to be a member of the Lakeview family again, saying that no other church has ever felt so much like home for her.


We welcome **Wendy** back to Lakeview and look forward to the day when we can see her face-to-face in worship!



## **MODERATOR'S MESSAGE**

I am happy to be serving as moderator for 2021. It is going to be an exciting year, though I doubt anyone is willing to predict what lies ahead. We have started the year remotely and will stay that way for a while longer, first because of 'the sickness' as my grandchildren call it. And second, because of the building repairs. During this time we have been blessed to have a creative and dedicated worship team - most doing nothing at all like the work they did pre-covid. Everyone is trying as best they can to keep Lakeview going. They are doing an amazing job.

March 8, 2020, was our last in-person worship. It has been a whole year since we have been together to talk, sing, hug, pray and eat donuts together. Everyone has felt the impact differently. Some are grateful for the chance to slow down, work calmly from home, and avoid the craziness of our previous busy schedules. Others are lonely. Some have continued to work full time with kids in tow, learning remotely. Some have done fine financially, others sink deeper into debt. What was your story? How are you doing? Someday, we can be together and share.

About those building repairs. Most people are aware that the brick facade is falling down. Yes, we just repaired it a "few" years ago. But here we are again. We have hired an engineer to assess the damage and determine the cause. He will provide recommendations for how to repair the walls. And then will oversee the construction of the new wall so we can get back together.

One of the issues the engineer pointed out was the lack of maintenance done over the past \_\_\_ years. Since the last repair. He's right. I don't remember re-caulking the windows ever being one of our pressing needs. Or repairing the flashing along the roof. When we fix this building, again, we need to remember not to take it for granted.

As he spoke, it made me think. How long has it been since we 'did maintenance' on our congregation? How often have we taken for granted that we will always be here, always be together, always have our music and donuts and scripture and sermon? Always have our Sunday morning routines. Always have our focus on mission. It's been a year. How are you feeling?

Executive Council conducted a survey to check the health and well-being and needs of our congregation. Almost half of the responders said they were very or extremely worried about Lakeview's future. And yet, almost every responder said they were ready to come back to regular worship. Not surprisingly, 80 percent of responders said what they missed most was the sense of community, of interacting with others in our church family. Over half said they would like to participate in some type of small group. My favorite response was "I don't know how a small group would work, but I like the idea."

Survey responses are still coming in and I will share more in the future, but I want you to know we are working on it. As building repairs continue, as the vaccinations continue and we move toward our new normal, we will also work on building avenues for reconnecting and reforming that sense of community. Beginning Feb 21 we will do an after church 'coffee hour' by zoom. Details to be provided. And why not continue our Lunch and Learn on the second Sunday each month. Bring your lunch, stay in your comfy clothes, and join our first Lunch & Learn on March 14. Need help with accessing the service or joining a zoom get-together? Contact Natalie in the church office, 513-683-2073) and we can arrange help. We are in this together. We are a family. And we are going to be fine.

Bill, David, John, Dan (my brother's names), Frank (my Dad's name) George, Bob, Bruno, Bruce, Jay, Ellis, Alejandro, "Big Tex", Naomi, Trinity, Lorenzo, even Asgia and Russell, AKA "The Ancient One", Asgia and "Vicky Rose" formerly known as Francisco, tries to find his true identity. In state and federal prisons across the USA, all are lonely, trying to survive.

Dominic is an artist--has cancer, still trying, though told he WILL die soon. Rocco is intelligent, but has "angry, uncontrollable" spells--needs help instead of beatings--but gives long descriptions of the many places he's been transferred in and out of--close to, far from, family and visits. He wrote: "Half the year gone just like that-sad-how our lives waste away in here. I don't understand this and question myself. I have spent all these years in prison. The other day I met an 18-year-old from my hometown, from an area I used to live in. I've been incarcerated his whole life! I am getting old and don't want to. Not in here at least. Ellis is an M.D. and adds it on his return address. His sadness shows in the great poetry and uplifting religious words he sends. Patricia has worked nearly every job at Dayton C.I. and enjoyed the Dog rearing program in spite of having to take the dog(s) out into the muddy or icy yard in bad weather. She is over 75 years old, innocent of the crime, and has become a friend of many. She told us of the need for yarn and material there so we could help!

Some are guilty, accept it, complain or try to redeem themselves with many programs offered. Some are innocent and spend years trying to prove it by research, Innocence Projects, writing letters pleading for help. Some are in segregation (single cell), others in row of bunks with only walking room between the beds--no room for personal items. Others have radios, typewriters, and other things to pass the time.

Those on Death Row in KS have been told for 2 years they would soon be put into "population" instead of locked away all alone. Now those in single cells say solitary is the only way to survive the Virus--out of the many who have been so ill and many who died from it. David has become a lawyer, filing cases for others and is involved in many those courts. Desi, and Anthony are poets, Darrell and Russell are artists.

Nearly all have written saying how much our Newsletters have meant to them, but understanding my "health issues" now, and say to thank you all for providing the support you gave to send the letters to them. They are truly grateful! So, now you've "met" a few of those you've helped for many years, 4-5 times each year. Most tell of either saving the letter to re-read or passing it on to others there, or even mailing it to others. Your help has gone far and wide.

Each of them sends respect and appreciation to me, but also to those who made this mission possible. Due to Rosemary's Uncle Bob's generosity we have also helped other "helping groups" with donations to their efforts and good work. I thank Todd, Lois and Natalie who helped so much over the years with printing these Link articles to keep in touch with the our supporters. I close this the same way I close the newsletters.

# **Executive Council Meeting Minutes**

Executive Council Minutes, January 31, 2021

Present: Todd Peterson, Corey Nieman, Debbie Kumararaj, Steven Friedhoff, Rosemary Ennis, Will Huber, Karen Baumann, Jody McOsker, Molly Miller

Opening Prayer was led by Karen Baumann.

Motion made by Karen Baumann to approve January 24 congregational minutes. Second by Steve Friedhoff. Motion Passed.

Jody McOsker began the meeting by asking Karen to discuss the need to update the Corporate Resolution.

Karen made a motion accept the new officers as listed on the Corporate Resolution to conduct business for Lakeview UCC during the fiscal year 2021. Second by Will Huber. Motion passed.

Karen continued with financial business. She said we have two bills from Axil. One was for \$20,000 due on January 3. The other is for \$20,000 which is due on February 1. Karen proposed paying for them by using \$10,000 through a donor and \$33, 800 from the 2020 Burgett estate. We could cover those two bills without triggering the line of credit from Cornerstone. Will made a motion to spend \$10,000 from our checking account (donor) and \$30,000 from the Burgett estate. Second by Rosemary Ennis. Motion passed.

Jody led a review of the constitution and bylaws. One item that was discussed was the need to understand the responsibilities of the Executive Committee and the Church Council. There was also talk about the possible need to update the Human Resource Manual. This manual is mandatory by the insurance company. Jody will check on when it was last updated.

Another item discussed was which committees are active. Steve Friedhoff said there are very few active committees- Worship and Membership. Several committees have been combined.

Corey Nieman asked who is considered a full member. What if someone is attending virtually but out of the geographical area? Pastor Todd said a member doesn't have to physically be in the building. An active person can participate in the worship service or make a donation or respond to a letter that says they want to maintain their active membership.

Jody asked the Council to answer the following questions- Who are we as a church (our vision)? What do we do (our mission)? How do we do it (path forward)? This will be done individually and then the responses will be put together. Jody will also share the results of the church wide survey.

Jody also asked church employees to write down what they were originally hired to do and what they are doing now.

The next Executive Council meeting will include Church Council. The meeting will be February 21 at 2:00.

Steve Friedhoff made a motion to adjourn. Second by Will Huber. The motion passed.

The meeting adjourned at 3:00.
